The first is by a well known visitor to Australian shores, Forrest (Woody) Mosten, mediation practitioner and president of Mosten Mediation Centers. His book *Mediation Career Guide* is, like many other American texts on dispute resolution, published by Jossey-Bass, San Francisco (2001). dispute resolution firm. His book, *Becoming a Mediator, An Insider's Guide to Exploring Careers in Mediation*, is also published by Jossey-Bass (2002). This text has two sections, one on 'becoming a mediator' and the other a very extensive — but also very American — resources section. Always of interest to mediators is the discussion on the personality traits of successful mediators. There is also a career aptitude checklist, an interesting device given the number of people who 'train' as mediators but never develop any experience.

No guarantees in these two texts, and we do not need to be told that

'compete for more business'. The court is offering a scheme to fast track big commercial cases with intensive 'judicial management'. According to the Queensland Bar Association this is designed to get more legal firms to bring their commercial cases to Queensland and counteract recent slippage to other States. The report suggests that the scheme could keep money in the local economy that might otherwise disappear to other jurisdictions, and could also lure trade practice matters from the Federal Court to the Supreme Court. The scheme will begin on 1 May. No reference was made to sponsorship. ●
