

Notes on Contributors

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Rosita Dellios is Associate Professor of International Relations at Bond University. She teaches Chinese defence policy and strategic affairs, as well as trends analysis for the international future. She has published one book on China's defence strategy, co-edited a book on Confucian humanism, and published numerous articles and book chapters. Besides contributing to advancing scholarship on the philosophical basis of Chinese defence doctrine, she has researched and published on classical concepts of power and regionalism in Southeast Asia.

Brett McCormick is the Director of Global Studies at the University of New Haven. He received his B.A. in Asian Studies at the State University of Stony Brook, and his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in History at Cornell University. His publications and research interests have included the fields of early modern Chinese and Japanese intellectual history and political philosophy, contemporary East Asian diplomatic and security relations, and particular focus on China-Japan relations. Since 2002 he has been the co-director of the East Asia Security Symposium, along with Su Hao of the China Foreign Affairs University.

Jonathan H. Ping is Assistant Professor of International Relations at Bond University. He has published extensively in the fields of international political economy and international relations. He is a graduate of the University of Melbourne and received his Ph.D. from the University of Adelaide. He specialises in the study of statecraft. In this area he has developed the first unifying theory of the middle power concept—hybridisation theory—as presented in his book *Middle Power Statecraft*. Dr Ping teaches courses on International Political Economy, International Development and South Asia.

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Andrew R. Wilson is Professor of Strategy at the United States Naval War College. He is a graduate of the University of California, Santa Barbara, and received his Ph.D. in History and East Asian Languages from Harvard University. Prior to joining the Naval War College faculty in 1998, he taught courses in Chinese history at Wellesley College and at Harvard University. He is the author of numerous publications on Chinese military history, Chinese sea power and Sun Tzu's Art of War. Professor Wilson is a founding member of the War College's Asia-Pacific Studies Group and the China Maritime Studies Institute.
